

Summary:—There was good shower during the week under report. The character of the weather and its effect was not so favourable to the standing crop due to continuous rainfall during last few weeks. Harvesting was reported from 9 stations and cattle disease was reported from 4 Subdivisions. The prospect of standing crop and its estimated outturn was however, satisfactory. Scarcity of fodder was reported from 3 Subdivisions. The rate of wages of labourers varied from annas 12 to Rs. 2-8 per head per day. The lowest rate was prevailing at Satkira Subdivision while the highest at Narayanganj, Dacca, Mymensingh and many other places of the Province.
